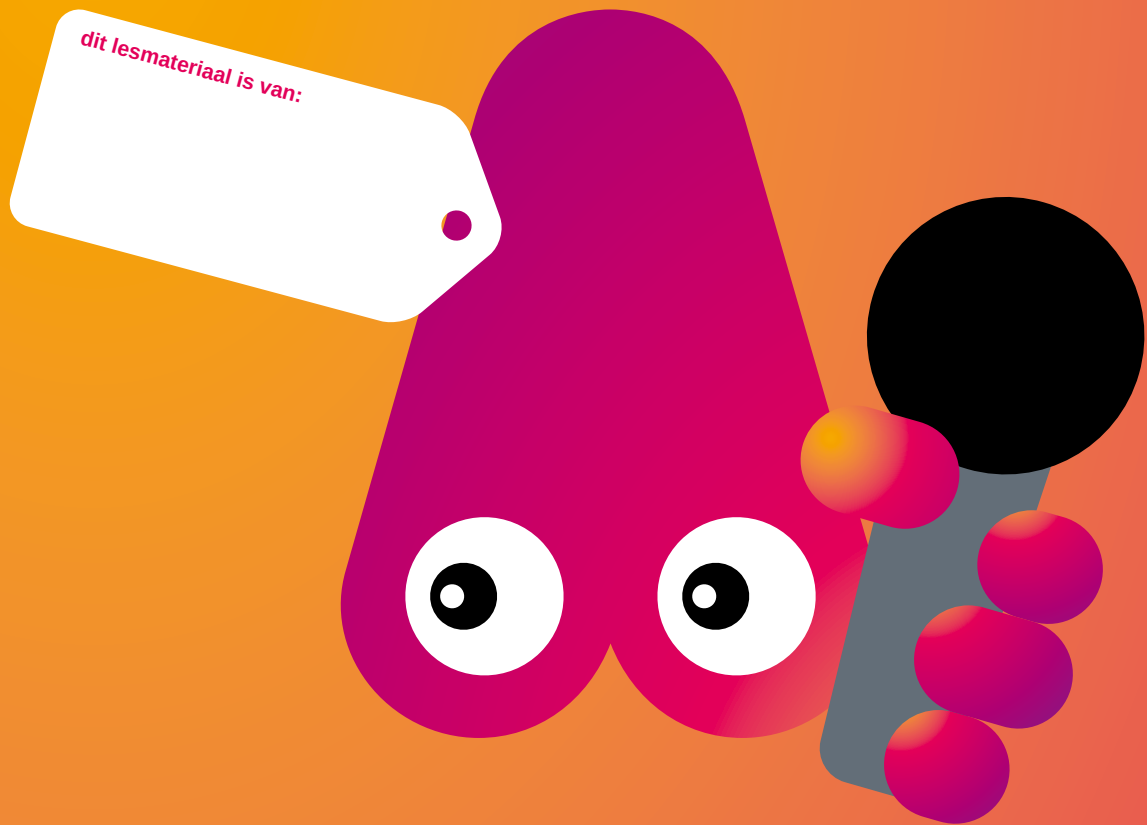
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NEWS BROADCASTING USING GREEN SCREEN TECHNOLOGY

Activity:

The weather report on television is the best example of green screen technology. The weather reporter stands in front of a screen and indicates to things on a map that appears to be behind them. We see it as one image, but actually there are two images mixed together. To understand this technique, the workshop will begin with you using your own news item and a self-made or selected background. We will then shoot our items against various backgrounds and with different “news reporters” (pupils), reporting from somewhere in the world. This creates a complete television news program with different reporters from different areas. News from the sea, space, Australia, Cuba, or from the garden you drew yourself you can create anything you want.

Objective:

Pupils learn to work in groups, learn how to make a news item and to present it in front of a camera.

They learn interview techniques and how to act in a virtual environment. They also learn how to use a video or photo camera and a computer program for photo editing.

Target group:

Pupils from 10 years old to the first two years of high school

Required equipment:

One computer per group, digital board for instructions and presentation, video camera (alternative: photo camera), tripods, MovieMaker (with Rehan FX plugin) or iMovie and a green panel.

Duration: 3 hours

1 hour instruction and inventing news items
1 hour developing ideas, making background images and items
1 hour editing and presentation



HOW TO SET UP YOUR CLASS:

1. Show the class examples of what they are going to make:

2. Divide the class into groups of about 4 to 6 pupils. Each group picks one or two news items. They will come up with the subjects for the news themselves.
3. Start by creating backgrounds. This can be done with pictures, images from the Internet or the pupils' own drawings that will be photographed later.
4. Let the pupils divide the tasks between them. Camera, directing, editing, reporters, interviewers and interviewees, etc.
5. Then filming, directing and acting follows! It is great to see your classmate as a newscaster, interviewer or interviewee. Everyone has brilliant fun creating and searching for news and recording the news items.



TIPS

- Don't come up with news items that are too complex.
- As well as photo or images, you can also project a film as a background.

WORKSHEET

GREENSCREEN TECHNIK



WRITE DOWN:

Collect all the ideas for possible news items that could be presented.

INSPIRATION:

Fantasy news, or very recent news

List: Everyone makes a list of ideas

Select: Everyone selects one of his/her own ideas

Select: With the group, you select one or two ideas

PRESENTER(S):

Who's going to present? Who's interviewing who?

EXCITEMENT AND INFORMATION:

Is it happy news, sad, serious, silly?

ITEM:

Where is it? What happened?
